Hello Heron Cay residents, welcome to May and Happy Mother's Day!!

April was a bit busy here in Heron Cay. Management hired a company to trim trees along the perimeter, at the entrance and in common areas throughout the community before hurricane season hits us.

The timer for the lights on the tennis/pickleball court have been adjusted so that the lights go off at 10 pm.

Some residents are experiencing problems with their fobs not working on the clubhouse doors. If you take your fob into the management office and it can be reset to work with the doors, there is no charge. However, if the fob cannot be reset and has to be replaced, there will be a fee of \$8.00 for a new fob.

Although FP&L installed new lights throughout the community, there are still dark areas. Management is working on finding out exactly where those dark areas are and will be installing solar lights.

Our community is changing, with new, younger residents moving into Heron Cay and wishing to work out before they start their workday. The exercise room has limited space and limited equipment. It tends to be very crowded in the early mornings and residents are not able to use the machine they want. The HOA Board requested earlier access and are now happy to say that the parking lot door near the exercise room now will open at 6 am.

As you know, Countryside's pool is still out of commission and their residents are using our pool as well as Vero Palm's. This is just a reminder that if you are noticing or experiencing rudeness or disrespectfulness from visitors, you should call the Heron Cay Management Office - (772) 567-0480. If it is a weekend, call the management non-emergency number - (772) 201-1667 - and

leave a message. This way management will be able to have a date and time to review the surveillance video(s).

Some of you may remember when we had pool bracelets for our residents to identify residents and residents' guests without having to have an awkward conversation with an unfamiliar pool guest. If you want a bracelet, you can pick one up from the ELS office or the HOA office.

The HOA held its Open Informational Meeting on April 15<sup>th</sup> and we shared with our residents what the HOA does for our community. For those of you who are not familiar with us, we'd like to give you a little history, a little background and a bit of information.

The Heron Cay community opened in 1985 and shortly after that our HOA was created. We operate under the law of Florida Statute 723, which is commonly known as the Florida Mobile Home Act and governs the legal framework for mobile home park operations and the rights of mobile home owners.

The HOA Board of Directors meets monthly with our community manager and quarterly with Heron Cay's owner's Regional Manager to address issues about community management and to discuss the concerns of homeowners. Reports of the progress of these issues are included in the minutes of the monthly Board meetings and are subsequently posted on the HOA website which is available to Association members.

The HOA advocates on behalf of homeowners regarding any issues affecting them, including lawn care, security, community activities, as well as the general upkeep of our amenities.

Each Board member serves a two-year term, beginning on March 1st. Our membership elected or re-elected four members to the Board this past February. Those members were 1<sup>st</sup> Vice President Jack Manno, 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President Billy DiGirolamo, Director Ed Collins and Director Mike Tortora. Our other three members – President Bonnie McNair, Secretary Donnia Trent, and Treasurer Elsie Quintero - will all be up for re-election at the end of our term, which will be February 28, 2026.

For our residents' convenience, our HOA maintains a website – <u>www.heroncayhoa.org</u>. Glenda Levesque and Donnia Trent maintain the website, keeping it up-to-date and easy to navigate. Any resident of Heron Cay can get onto the website and find a wealth of information including information about the HOA, our Board of Directors, our Disaster/Emergency Relief Plan of Action, Florida Statute 723, Florida Administrative Code 61B and the FMO. It also contains the four Heron Cay prospectuses, as well as the latest update of these prospectuses.

In addition to the public side of our website, we have the "members side" where HOA members have access to the minutes of Board meetings, as well as the minutes of our meetings with Management and Regional. That portion of our website also has our Bylaws and Articles of Incorporation as well as the contact information of our HOA members.

In order to keep our community informed, we have a staff of volunteers who put together this monthly newsletter that can be downloaded from our website by anyone. Or you can pick up a copy in the rack outside the HOA office any time. We also prepare a monthly calendar of events, which can be downloaded from the website or can be obtained at the rack outside the HOA office.

We have a group of dedicated volunteers who work to keep our residents up to date with what affects them, such as Indian River County's Community Emergency Response Team, known as

CERT. Helena Krasa is Heron Cay's Representative and she encourages anyone who is interested in becoming a CERT volunteer to contact her. Her contact information is in the newsletter every month.

Our Fun N Games Committee hosts dances and parties throughout the year. Please look for their article in this newsletter where they will share what their upcoming events are.

Gwen Ripp is our community representative at the Federation of Manufactured Homeowners of Florida, also known as the FMO, keeping us informed as to what is happening in the legislature regarding mobile home parks such as ours.

ELS owns 81 age qualified manufactured home communities in Florida. <u>Networking For Progress</u> consists of HOA Board Members from our communities and they represent all the HOAs in ELS owned communities throughout Florida. They meet with ELS Corporate's Select Committee on a regular basis with concerns that all ELS communities have and they report back to our HOAs with any news.

Representatives of the Heron Cay HOA, along with our four sister parks - Countryside, Heritage Plantation, Vero Palm and Village Green - get together monthly to discuss our mutual concerns. And our <u>Networking for Progress</u> representative then takes those concerns to ELS Corporate to discuss possible solutions.

Our Welcoming Committee makes sure that as soon as management lets us know of a new resident, one of them visits that home and delivers a welcome bag filled with useful information about Heron Cay, Vero Beach, Indian River County and our surrounding area. If you are a new resident and you have not heard from our Welcoming Committee, please feel free to contact any of our Board members and we will be happy to make sure you are properly welcomed to Heron Cay.

Our That's Entertainment Committee, schedules 2 big shows in January and February of each year, such as magicians, comedians, murder mystery evenings and singers.

There are many regularly scheduled events for our community throughout the year – such as Bingo, Music Bingo, "Friendly" Feud, The Bunco Game, Shuffleboard, and Bocce. Each of those activities has at least one, but usually more than one person in charge of it, and a Board member is a liaison for that activity, in case there is a problem or a question that needs guidance.

All community events are posted in this newsletter, in our mail kiosks, on the auditorium bulletin board and in the clubhouse lobby shadow box as well as on the marquee outside the clubhouse.

In addition, Heron Cay also has a wide variety of other activities our residents can enjoy such as art classes, bridge, canasta, ceramics, line dancing, neighborhood watch, pickleball, quilting, walk aerobics and water aerobics. You can do as much – or as little – as you want in our community. Information about those activities can be found on our <a href="https://www.heroncayhoa.org">www.heroncayhoa.org</a> website.

We encourage you to consider becoming a member of the HOA – the dues are only \$25 per year per household – about the price of breakfast for two at McDonalds! There is strength in numbers and a strong membership shows management that our Heron Cay residents support the HOA.

#### A few reminders:

Please remember that dogs must be on a leash when you are walking them. There are doggie trash bags supplied in various areas around the community. Please clean up after your fur babies. And remember, that dogs are not allowed in the clubhouse or the activity areas around the clubhouse. This includes the bocce and shuffleboard courts, the tiki hut and the pool. (See Exhibit "C" of your prospectus, #5 under "II Heron Cay Club Rules").

Please note that **effective April 3<sup>rd</sup>**, the HOA Thursday afternoon office hours were changed. We are now open on Thursdays from 1 pm to 2 pm. We continue our Tuesday evening hours of 6 pm to 7 pm.

The trash can in the tiki hut is emptied daily by our maintenance crew but if you are having a party there, please remember to empty the can and throw the garbage into the dumpster which is located in our parking lot next to the side door of the clubhouse.

So, this is May. Did you know that.....

May 1<sup>st</sup> is **International Workers' Day,** dedicated to the struggles and achievements of workers and the labor movement. Many European countries celebrated the beginning of summer and fertility on May 1<sup>st</sup> with traditions like dancing around a maypole. May 4<sup>th</sup> brings us **Star Wars Day**, so may the force – and the fourth - be with you. It's **World Laughter Day**, created in 1998 by Dr. Madan Kataria, founder of the worldwide Laughter Yoga movement. It's a positive manifestation for world peace, intended to build up a global

consciousness of brotherhood and friendship throughout laughter. And I thought it was just a day to tell a lot of jokes! It's also **International Firefighters Day**, a day to salute the men and women who help keep us safe. Thank you all for racing into danger as we are racing out.

#### ANOTHER CELEBRATION

Remember celebrating last year as we joined together to recognize the official establishment of Heron Cay as a manufactured home community – June 1984 – forty years ago!?!?!

Within a year of that date, a group of enthusiastic homeowners pursued legal procedures to develop the Article of Incorporation for the Heron Cay Homeowners Association, approved by the State in April 1985 – forty years ago!!! It is through their efforts that the Heron Cay Homeowners Association exists today.

#### What To Do When A Hurricane Nears

Here is a list of the many things to consider before, during and after a hurricane. Some of the safety rules will make things easier for you during a hurricane. All are important and **could help save your life** and the lives of others.

#### Stay or Leave?

When a hurricane threatens your area, you will have to make the decision whether you should evacuate or whether you can ride out the storm in safety at home. If local authorities recommend evacuation, you should leave! Their advice is based on knowledge of the strength of the storm and its potential for death and destruction.

#### In General

- If you live on the coastline or offshore islands, plan to leave.
- If you live in a mobile home, plan to leave.
- If you live near a river or in a flood plain, plan to leave.
- If you live on high ground, away from coastal beaches, consider staying.

In any case, the ultimate decision to stay or leave will be yours. Study the following list and carefully consider the factors involved - especially the items pertaining to storm surge.

#### At Beginning of Hurricane Season (June) Make Plans for Action

- · Learn the storm surge history and elevation of your area.
- Learn the safe routes inland. Learn location of official shelters.
- · Take pictures for insurance purposes.
- · Protect your boat before the storm. Boatus.com
- · Trim back dead wood from trees.
- · Check for loose rain gutters and down spouts.
- · If shutters do not protect windows stock boards to cover glass.

#### When a Hurricane Watch is Issued for Your Area

- Check often for official bulletins on radio station WFLM The Flame 104.5 FM, TV, or NOAA Weather Radio.
- Fuel car.
- Check mobile home tie-downs.
- · Moor small craft or move to safe shelter.
- · Stock up on canned provisions.
- · Check supplies of special medicines and drugs.
- · Check batteries for radio and flashlights.
- Secure lawn furniture and other loose material outdoors.
- · Board, or shutter windows to prevent shattering.

 Wedge sliding glass doors to prevent their lifting from their tracks.

#### When a Hurricane Warning is Issued for Your Area

- Stay tuned to radio station WFLM The Flame 104.5 FM, TV, or NOAA Weather Radio for official bulletins.
- Stay home if sturdy and on high ground.
- Board up garage and porch doors.
- Move valuables to upper floors or in dishwasher.
- · Bring in pets.
- Fill containers (bathtub) with several days supply of drinking water
- Turn up refrigerator to maximum cold and don't open unless necessary.
- · Use phone only for emergencies. Charge cell phones.
- Stay indoors on the downwind side of the house away from windows.
- · Beware of the eye of the hurricane.
- · Leave mobile homes.
- Leave areas which might be affected by storm tide or stream flooding.
- · Leave early in daylight if possible.
- · Shut off water and electricity at main stations.
  - Take small valuables and papers but travel light.
     Puddy Kat says: "Please don't forget to prepare your pets for evacuation!" Some shelters will not take them. Call the Emergency
     Management Office in your county now & find

out. Some motels are pet friendly, check

petswelcome.com. Don't forget the microchip!

- Lock up house.
- Drive carefully to nearest designated shelter using. recommended evacuation routes.

#### After the All-Clear is Given

- Drive carefully: watch for dangling electrical wires, undermined roads, flooded low spots.
- · Don't sight see.
- · Report broken or damaged water, sewer, and electrical lines.
- Use caution re-entering home. Wait until daylight.
- · Check for mold, gas leaks, broken glass, nails, and sharp debris.

Disaster Supplies Kit

Assemble supplies you might need in an evacuation. Store them in

Check food and water for spoilage.

#### (5) Special Needs Registry

The people that are frail, elderly, or handicapped and will need assistance in evacuating should REGISTER NOW with their county's Emergency Management Office.

- A supply of water (one gallon per person per day). Store water in sealed, unbreakable containers. Identify the storage date and
- replace every six months.
   A supply of non-perishable packaged or canned food and a non-electric can opener.
- A change of clothing, rain gear and sturdy shoes.
- Blankets or sleeping bags.
- A first aid kit and prescription medications.

- An extra pair of glasses
- A battery-powered radio, flashlight and plenty of extra batteries.
- Credit cards and cash.
- · An extra set of car keys.
- · A list of family physicians.
- A list of important family information; the style and serial number of medical devices such as pacemakers.
- Special items for infants, elderly or disabled family members.
