HOA BOARD MESSAGE: Welcome to the month of July, and Happy Fourth!

Many of our residents are upset about trespassers using our pool over the weekend and in the evenings. This has been addressed numerous time – both at the HOA board meetings and in our monthly newsletters. Heron Cay has a No Trespass Order. IF someone is at our pool who doesn't belong there and it's taking place on the weekdays during office hours, please call the office at 772- 567-0480 and report it so that they can send someone to the pool to speak with the offender and ask them to leave. If it is on a weekend or in the evening, call the Sheriff, tell them Heron Cay has a No Trespass Order and we need someone removed from the pool. A deputy will come, take the offender's information and issue them a warning. The next time the offender comes to the pool, they will be arrested. It's when we step up that things will change.

SCAM ALERT Recently, the Vero Beach Police Department has received numerous reports of scams where victims receive phone calls from what appears to be their bank alerting them to fraudulent activity. The scammers are masking their phone numbers to appear as various legitimate banking institution phone numbers. This is referred to as "Caller ID spoofing". It is a type of technology scammers use to mask their phone numbers so an incoming call or text appears to come from a legitimate financial institution. It is often done through third party applications. When in doubt, DO NOT respond. Instead, contact your bank directly for further assistance and confirmation.

On another note, we need to warn all residents about the Cane Toad. Also known as the Bufo Toad, it has been spotted around Heron Cay. In Florida they are the main toxic toad to be aware of. These toads are an invasive species and their skin secretions, containing bufotoxin are highly toxic to pets, particularly dogs.

They are more prevalent in the summer in Florida and can be deadly to your dog. Licking or biting a cane toad can cause serious reactions, including seizures and death within minutes. Toads are most active after rainfall, at dawn, at dusk or nighttime so dog owners beware.

If your dog has been exposed to one of these highly toxic toads, or any toad, getting them to a veterinarian immediately is essential. There is no specific antidote. Treatment is directed at minimizing absorption of the venom, along with supportive treatment. The mouth should be immediately and thoroughly flushed. So, be careful out there!

And a few reminders:

During the summer months, we have younger family members visiting us. Please remember the speed limit in Heron Cay is 15 mph.

If you are at the pool and it looks as though a storm is coming, please be sure to lower the table umbrellas so that don't get damaged. Also, when you are leaving the pool, please be sure to lower the umbrellas.

The Heron Cay HOA represents all residents of our community. We need your support. Membership is only \$25 per calendar year, per household. What To Do When A Hurricane Nears

Here is a list of the many things to consider before, during and after a hurricane. Some of the safety rules will make things easier for you during a hurricane. All are important and **could help save your life** and the lives of others.

Stay or Leave?

When a hurricane threatens your area, you will have to make the decision whether you should evacuate or whether you can ride out the storm in safety at home. **If local authorities recommend evacuation, you should leave!** Their advice is based on knowledge of the strength of the storm and its potential for death and destruction.

In General

- If you live on the coastline or offshore islands, **plan to leave.**
- If you live in a mobile home, **plan to leave.**
- If you live near a river or in a flood plain, **plan to leave.**
- If you live on high ground, away from coastal beaches, **consider staying.**

In any case, the ultimate decision to stay or leave will be yours. Study the following list and carefully consider the factors involved - especially the items pertaining to storm surge.

At Beginning of Hurricane Season (June) Make Plans for Action

- Learn the storm surge history and elevation of your area.
- Learn the safe routes inland. • Learn location of official shelters.
- **Take pictures for insurance purposes.**
- Protect your boat before the storm. **Boatus.com**
- Trim back dead wood from trees.
- Check for loose rain gutters and down spouts.
- If shutters do not protect windows stock boards to cover glass.

When a Hurricane Watch is Issued for Your Area

- Check often for official bulletins on radio station **WFLM The Flame 104.5 FM, TV, or NOAA Weather Radio.**
- Fuel car.
- Check mobile home tie-downs.
- Moor small craft or move to safe shelter.
- Stock up on canned provisions.
- Check supplies of special medicines and drugs.
- Check batteries for radio and flashlights.
- Secure lawn furniture and other loose material outdoors.
- Board, or shutter windows to prevent shattering.

- Wedge sliding glass doors to prevent their lifting from their tracks.

When a Hurricane Warning is Issued for Your Area

- Stay tuned to radio station **WFLM The Flame 104.5 FM, TV, or NOAA Weather Radio** for official bulletins.
- Stay home if sturdy and on high ground.
- Board up garage and porch doors.
- Move valuables to upper floors or in dishwasher.
- Bring in pets.
- Fill containers (bathtub) with several days supply of drinking water.
- Turn up refrigerator to maximum cold and don't open unless necessary.
- Use phone only for emergencies. **Charge cell phones.**
- Stay indoors on the downwind side of the house away from windows.
- Beware of the eye of the hurricane.
- **Leave mobile homes.**
- Leave areas which might be affected by storm tide or stream flooding.
- Leave early - in daylight if possible.
- Shut off water and electricity at main stations.

- Take small valuables and papers but travel light.

- Puddy Kat says: "Please don't forget to prepare your pets for evacuation!" Some shelters will not take them. Call the **Emergency Management Office** in your county now & find out. Some motels are pet friendly, check **petswelcome.com. Don't forget the microchip!**



- Lock up house.
 - Drive carefully to nearest designated shelter using recommended evacuation routes.
- ## After the All-Clear is Given
- Drive carefully: watch for dangling electrical wires, undermined roads, flooded low spots.
 - Don't sight see.
 - Report broken or damaged water, sewer, and electrical lines.
 - Use caution re-entering home. Wait until daylight.
 - Check for mold, gas leaks, broken glass, nails, and sharp debris.
 - Check food and water for spoilage.

Special Needs Registry

The people that are frail, elderly, or handicapped and will need assistance in evacuating should REGISTER NOW with their county's Emergency Management Office.

Disaster Supplies Kit

Assemble supplies you might need in an evacuation. Store them in an easy-to-carry container such as a backpack or duffel bag.

Include:

- A supply of water (one gallon per person per day). Store water in sealed, unbreakable containers. Identify the storage date and replace every six months.
- A supply of non-perishable packaged or canned food and a non-electric can opener.
- A change of clothing, rain gear and sturdy shoes.
- Blankets or sleeping bags.
- A first aid kit and prescription medications.
- An extra pair of glasses
- A battery-powered radio, flashlight and plenty of extra batteries.
- Credit cards and cash.
- An extra set of car keys.
- A list of family physicians.
- A list of important family information; the style and serial number of medical devices such as pacemakers.
- Special items for infants, elderly or disabled family members.

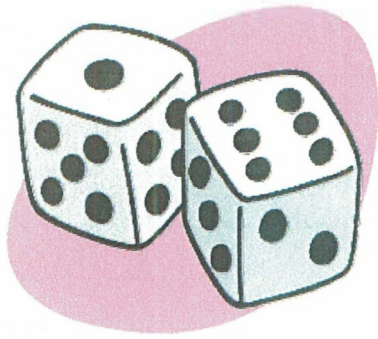

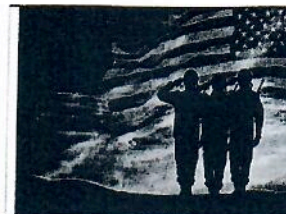

F M O / LEGISLATION

The FMO continues to monitor the progress of legislation that can affect homeowners in manufactured home communities. The legislature passed Senate Bill 594 relating to local housing assistance plans to assist mobile homeowners, who qualify, with their lot rent. This currently awaits the Governor's signature. If so approved, the next step for homeowners will be at the local level with the County Planning Office. *Stay tuned !*

The tax relief package (HB 7031-E) has language for a 3% cap on the amount of rate increase in the annual county assessment on the value of the park or community. If the park meets the criteria and the taxpayer (park owner) is approved for the reduced rate for the assessment increase, it should reduce the amount of the ad valorem tax that is passed on the mobile homeowners. *Stay tuned !*

It is important that we, as mobile homeowners, keep up to date on issues and concerns that may affect each of us, particularly in the pocketbook. FMO is our avenue to maintain information on these matters. That means membership! Income from membership dues is the only support that allows FMO to strengthen its effectiveness in representing mobile home communities throughout the State. Current annual dues are \$40 per member. Take advantage of a three-year reduced rate of \$102, reflecting a 15% savings for members. For details on the benefits of FMO membership, and application procedures, simply access fmo.org.
